A WORD from the Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,

I intended to preach the following sermon last year on Easter 3. Due to the fire, however, the preaching schedule was changed and I filed it away in the archives. Since this text does not appear in our Lectionary for a few years, rather than saving it, I thought I would provide the sermon manuscript as a newsletter article for your edification. Before reading it, I encourage you to take a look at the text on which it is based, Luke 24:13-35.

How to Read the Bible

In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of Holy Spirit. Amen.

One of the main themes of our readings for the first few Sundays of the Easter Season has to do with the importance of the Bible. We heard this very clearly in our Gospel lesson from last week at the end of John chapter 20. St John writes that "these things are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in His name." So also, in today's Gospel lesson, the account of the Emmaus disciples, we heard something very similar. In particular, St Luke tells us that "beginning with Moses and all the prophets, [Jesus] interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning Himself." These texts are foundational ones for a right understanding of the Bible.

There are many people in the world today who have a very low view of the Bible. They either think that the Bible is just a book like any other book, or they think that the Bible is an important book, but that the Bible by itself is not important enough, and that we need more than just the Bible. It should not surprise us that those who have a low view of the Bible also tend to have a very low view of Jesus. When people say that the Bible is just a book like any other book, they usually say that Jesus was just a man like any other man. When people say that the Bible is important, but that we need more than just the Bible, they usually say that Jesus is important too but we need more than just the work of Jesus to be saved. There is an inseparable link between Jesus and the Bible. Faith in Jesus is not a different thing than faith in the truthfulness of the Bible. When we believe what the Bible says, we believe what Jesus would have us believe. To receive the Bible is to receive Jesus. To reject the Bible is to reject Jesus. Jesus and the Bible go together. So, in today's sermon, I would like for us to think more about our relationship to the Bible. More specifically, on the basis of what we see in our reading from Luke

chapter 24, I'd like for us to think about how we are to read the Bible.

In the first place, we are to read the Bible as God's Word. When Jesus corrected the Emmaus disciples and gave them a proper understanding of His work as the Messiah, and the necessity of His death and resurrection, He did so by pointing them to the Bible. Again, as Saint Luke says, "And beginning with Moses and all the prophets, [Jesus] interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning Himself."

Yes, the Bible was written by men. It was written by ordinary men who in many ways where men just like you and me. But what made the things that those men wrote so special was not that they were special, but that God did something special through them. In the Lutheran Church we call this the doctrine of verbal inspiration. The doctrine of verbal inspiration simply means that God caused the human authors of the Bible to write the Bible and gave them the very words to write down in the Bible. God gave them the inclination to work and He guided their working. That is exactly what Saint Peter says in his second epistle. He writes, "No prophecy of Scripture comes from someone's own interpretation. For no prophecy was ever produced by the will of man, but men spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit." And Saint Paul says something similar in 2 Timothy chapter 3 when he writes, "All Scripture is breathed out by God." The Bible is inspired. It is inspired by God. It is not a book like any other book. Other books do not have the authority that the Bible has. Other books do not have the reliability that the Bible has. When we read other books, we cannot be certain that we are reading the Word of God, but we can be certain of that when we read the Bible.

If you know, a few decades ago there was a massive controversy in the Lutheran church over the Bible. Certain men, even at one of our seminaries, were teaching a method of studying the Bible called "higher criticism." They were teaching that we cannot always be certain of what the Bible says and that there are certain things in the Bible that are not true. They were evaluating the Bible by the same standards that they evaluated everything else. When the Bible says things that are hard to believe, they said that we Christians did not have to believe those things. They said that the Bible contained God's Word, but that the Bible was not God's Word. All of this teaching eventually culminated in the suspension of serval of those professors, the so-called "walk-out," where some students protested by leaving the seminary and starting a new seminary, and the eventual formation of the ELCA, the Evangelical Church in America.

There is a big problem, however, whenever we say that the Bible only contains God's Word and that all of it is not God's Word. When we say that the Bible only contains God's Word, and that parts of it are not God's Word, then we get to decide what is and is not God's Word. Then we get to take the place of God. But we cannot take the place of God. God is God and we are not God. When we try to be God, terrible things happen. That is what has happened in the ELCA and every other church body that has denied that all of the Bible is God's Word. They allow women to serve as pastors, even though the Bible says otherwise. They support and defend things like homosexuality and transgenderism, even though the Bible says otherwise. They open their altar to almost everyone who wants to take Communion regardless of their beliefs, even though the Bible says otherwise.

We Christians must listen to what the Bible says. We must listen to all of what the Bible says, even if our sinful hearts do not like what the Bible says. We must listen to what the Bible says, because whenever we deny one part of what the Bible says, eventually we will deny all of what the Bible says. Eventually we will deny the One who wrote the Bible.

On many occasions Jesus Himself pointed to the authority of the Bible. Jesus quoted the Bible as if it was the highest authority. He said things like, "it is written" and "have you not read." Jesus told His disciples to study the Bible and to look to the Bible for eternal life. He said things like, "the Scriptures cannot be broken" and "do not live by bread alone but by every Word that comes from the mouth of God." On the road to Emmaus, instead of just revealing Himself to the two disciples by telling them directly what they should believe, Jesus did so from the Bible. Jesus used all of the Scriptures, Moses and the prophets, to convince the Emmaus disciples of what had to happen for their salvation. The Bible led them in the right direction. The Bible made their hearts burn within them. Jesus showed them how to read the Bible, and that is how we ought to read the Bible too. We should read it as God's Word.

Second, and this is very much related to the first thing, we should let the Bible speak for itself. Since the Bible is God's Word and not our Word, we should not impose our own opinions and views on the Bible. We should not go looking in the Bible for what we want the Bible to say, but we should listen to what it says. We should interpret the Bible by letting the Bible interpret itself. That means reading passages in their context, and comparing different passages to each other. It means looking to very clear passages to help us understand the ones that appear to be difficult passages.

The Emmaus disciples struggled at first with letting the Bible speak for itself. They did not understand what had to happen to Jesus, because they were not thinking about Jesus according to what the Bible says about Him and what He said about Himself. They were thinking about Jesus according to what they wanted the Bible to say about Jesus. Saint Luke tells us that they were talking with each other about all the things that had happened. They were talking together about all of what they had experienced and seen in Holy Week. What Luke does not tell us is that they were talking about what they had experienced and seen in light of the Bible. In fact, Saint Luke even tells us that the Emmaus disciples said about Jesus, "We had hoped that He was the one to redeem Israel." The Emmaus disciples had hoped that Jesus was the kind of Messiah that they thought He should be, and not the kind of Messiah that the Bible says He would be. They did not understand that He had to died and rise, even though that is precisely what the Bible says

He came to do.

Jesus used the Bible to correct them. Jesus pointed them away from themselves, and their own opinions, and toward the written Word of God. Jesus said, "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken."

It is the mark of a fool to not let the Bible speak for itself. It is the mark of a fool to twist the Bible and try and make the Bible say what we want it to say instead of what it clearly says. Fools speak when they should let others speak. This, of course, can happen in many different ways when it comes to the Bible. It can happen when we take one small passage from the Bible out of its context, and apply it to things that it doesn't apply to. We can think here of those who take what the Bible says about loving others and use it to defend sinful behavior. They impose their views on the Bible instead of letting the Bible shape their views. They pit the Bible against itself, even though the Bible holds together. This, however, can also happen in a less obvious ways. There is a common practice among some Christians to read Bible passages and then go around in a circle and take turns saying what that Bible passage means to each one of them. But the Bible means what it means, and it's true meaning does not come from our own hearts but from the heart of God who wrote it. The Bible is clear and it is sufficient. What it means may not always be clear to us in a given moment, because sometimes we don't know the Bible as well as we should, but that is not a problem with the Bible. That is a problem with us. Furthermore, the way that that problem is solved is by reading more of the Bible. It is by submitting ourselves to what the Bible says, and comparing what it says inone place to what it says in another. That is what Jesus did with the Emmaus disciples. He corrected their misunderstanding of the Bible by using more of the Bible. He walked them through the whole Bible and showed them how all of the Bible holds together. We do not impose our views on the Bible. We let the Bible speak for itself. That is how we are to read the Bible.

Third, and most importantly, we are to read the Bible in order to receive Jesus. The Bible was not written for just any reason. It was written for the purpose of giving and strengthening our faith in the crucified and risen Lord. Jesus did not only show the Emmaus disciples that all of the Bible is God's Word and that the Bible should be interpreted in light of the Bible. He showed them how all of the Bible points to Him. Again, as St Luke says, "He interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning Himself."

The Bible is not about us. The Bible was written for us and the Bible has many things to say to us, but it is not about us. We are not the central character in the Bible, Jesus is. The Bible is the true story of how Jesus Christ has saved us from our sins. It is not about how we can save ourselves; it is about how Jesus has saved us. Whenever people make the Bible about themselves, they miss what the Bible is actually about, and they miss out on the greatest gift that the Bible gives. The Bible does have practical wisdom in it. It is possible that through reading the Bible we can learn how to do many things in this life, but the Bible is not so much concerned with us having happy lives as it is with our lives never ending. What matters most is not that we have a nice life here and now but that we don't spend eternal life in hell.

The only way to pass through this life and come to eternal life with Christ is through faith in Christ. We are saved is through faith in Jesus alone. We are saved by trusting in Christs' atoning sacrifice on the cross, and His resurrection from the dead that justifies us in the eyes of God. The Bible is God's tool to give us that faith. God gives us faith and works faith in our hearts through the Bible. He does it through reading the Bible. He does it through listening to the Bible read. He does it through sending men to preach on the Bible. He does it through bringing other Christians to us to speak the content of the Bible to us.

Through the Bible, God opens our hearts to receive Jesus, and He gives us Jesus. After the Emmaus disciples were led through the Bible, they wanted Jesus to stay with them. They wanted every bit of Jesus that they could get. They said to Jesus, "Abide with us, for it is toward evening and the day is far spent." Then Jesus opened their eyes in the breaking of the bread. Jesus led them through the Bible, so that they would trust in Him because of the Bible, and receive Him how the Bible says He wants to be received. Jesus showed them His work through the Bible, and then He made Himself known to them in the place where the Bible tells us to go. He led them from the Word to the Sacraments. We don't pit the Bible against Communion. We don't say that because we have Jesus in the Bible that we don't need to have Jesus in Communion. When we come to know through the Bible that Jesus loves us and has died and risen to forgive us all of our sins, we want to be wherever Jesus promises to be. We read the Bible to receive Jesus in faith and to be strengthen in the belief that He bore all of our sins and has taken them all away.

In today's sermon we talked about how we are to read the Bible. We talked about how we are to read the Bible as God's Word. We talked about how we are to read the Bible by letting the Bible speak for itself. We talked about how we are to read the Bible to receive Jesus, that is, for the sake of having saving faith in Him. All of these things assume that we are reading the Bible in the first place. On the basis of that, I'd like to close today's sermon by giving some concrete guidance for reading the Bible in general. What I'm going to say is Law, but it is Law for the people of God who know the Gospel. It is Law that is intended to encourage and help you as those who love the Bible to make the Bible a bigger part of your life.

We Christians need to read the Bible. We need to read the Bible every day. We need to come to church to hear the Bible read every Saturday or Sunday, but we also need to read it in our homes. When we only read the Bible at church, we give the impression that the Bible is only for church and that what the Bible says only matters at church even though that is not true. What the Bible says matters all the time. We need to read it all the time. If you do not read something from the Bible every single day you need to start doing it today. If you don't know where to start there are many great resources that can help. There are apps to use on your phone. There are reading plans you can find on the internet. If you have trouble understanding things in the Bible and that keeps you from reading the Bible, there are resources like the Lutheran Study Bible that were created to help with that very thing. Ask other Christians who you respect about how they read the Bible and try something they do, or just pick up a Bible and read it.

Parents, dads in particular, you need to read the Bible to your families. You need to read the Bible to those who cannot read the Bible for themselves. You need to set aside time at some point during the day, the dinner table, the breakfast table, before bed, in the car while your wife drives, and open the Bible and read it. Even if you don't think you know enough about the Bible, even if it is hard to find time to read the Bible, you need to do it. God will bless you families for doing it. That's what the Bible says. It says, "Fathers, bring up your children in the discipline and instruction of the Lord." It says, "Train a child up in the way he should go and when he is old, he will not depart from it." Make time for the Bible. Do whatever it takes.

Reading the Bible is not always easy. The Devil does not want you to read the Bible. He knows that when you read the Bible you are being fitted with the armor of God that repels His flaming darts and defends you from his attacks. He knows that when you read the Bible you are unsheathing the sword of the Spirit which has the power to hack him to pieces and send him fleeing far from you. The Bible is your greatest weapon and your best defense.

When we fail to read the Bible, we need to do the same thing what we should do every time we fail at anything. We repent and believe the Gospel. We look to the Bible. We look there for the forgiveness of our sins and then, by God's help, we start over. The Bible is where we look for comfort. That is where we turn to see and receive Jesus as our Redeemer from sin, death, and the power of the Devil. Through the Bible, God gives us faith in His Son. Through the Bible, God saves our souls by leading us to the One who promises rest for our souls. Through the Bible, God brings us to Jesus and Jesus to us. In Jesus' Name. Amen.

TEACHING THE FAITH — APRIL 1–15

This month, The Lutheran Church— Missouri Synod celebrates the many ways that God's children are instructed, encouraged and strengthened in the faith. By teaching the faith, we nurture the faithful and reach the lost.

Remember how God works to strengthen the faith of His people as you pray:

1.with thanksgiving for the gift of faith received at Baptism. Ask the Lord to continue to strengthen that faith — and the budding faith of our children — until we depart this life and are united with the Lord.

2.with thanksgiving to God for the gift of His holy and inspired Word, the Sacred Scriptures; and for the Book of Concord and the many teaching aids that help us understand that Word aright and rejoice in its consolation.

3.for Christian families, that the Lord would provide the assistance and tools necessary to overcome every challenge — big or small — that might drive them apart.

4.for strong Christian marriages, that husbands and wives would cling to each other in the Lord, despite life's challenges, and raise their children to walk in the way of the Lord.

5.for Christian parents, that they would make teaching the faith to their children a priority. Pray that they set aside time to worship together, talk about faith issues, study the Bible and have family devotions.

6.that family members would treat each other with kindness and patience, so that each member might be built up in the family of God.

7.for our children and young people, who face daily assaults on their Christian beliefs, that God would strengthen and encourage them to stand firm while sharing the Gospel.

8.for our churches, that they would provide useful education and programs to help equip people at every stage of life — teens, husbands and wives, parents, caretakers of aging parents and more.

9.that God would continue to provide faithful church workers to serve as role models and teach people about their identity as a baptized child of God.

10.that church members would eagerly volunteer their time and talents to support the congregation's educational programs, such as vacation Bible school, Sunday school and groups for young families.

11.that LCMS members woul deagerly participate in Bible studies, small-group discussions and private study.

12.with thanksgiving for faithful parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, teachers and other role models who help to "train up a child in the way he should go" (Prov. 22:6).

13. for the Concordia University System and the Synod's two seminaries, that the Lord would bless their work in training new generations of workers to serve the Church.

14. for the Synod's directors of Family Life Ministry, that God would bless their efforts to support healthy relationships in the families of our congregations.

15.that we might have hearts that are willing and eager to serve the Lord in every way.

MINISTRY TO THE ARMED FORCES — APRIL 16–30

Since the Civil War, LCMS pastors have served as military chaplains. Today, the Synod's Ministry to the Armed Forces (MAF) supports active duty, reserves, National Guard and Civil Air Patrol chaplains. MAF recruits, interviews and endorses all military chaplains and supports them throughout their careers. MAF also provides a network of care for our nation's military members, families and veterans through Operation Barnabas.

Remember God's work through LCMS Ministry to the Armed Forces (MAF) as you pray:

16. that God would bless and guide the work of the MAF director and assistant director.

17. for the President of the United States. Ask God to guide our commander in chief to lead with wisdom for the protection of the innocent against evil.

18. for LCMS military chaplains serving on active duty for the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines and Coast Guard.

19. for our LCMS Reserve and National Guard chaplains, especially those who have been mobilized stateside or overseas and taken from their parishes to extended active duty assignments, for those deployed, their families and their home parishes.

20. for Operation Barnabas, which is designed to meet the needs of congregations in the event their pastor/chaplain is mobilized. Operation Barnabas also seeks to assist veterans and military families during and after deployment.

21. for all congregations that reach out to members of our military through Operation Barnabas, that they would uphold them in prayer as they help to meet their physical, psychological and spiritual needs through the training they have received and the Lord's provision.

22. for increasing opportunities for LCMS chaplains to spread Christ's message of salvation, hope and restoration to those they serve.

23. for all chaplains returning home, that they would receive a hero's welcome for their sacrifice to this country so that in freedom we can continue to openly worship the one true God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

24. for those who suffer from battle stress and Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder. Pray that God would bring healing and renewal to those who have served or who are currently serving.

25. for all chaplains who are sick or have sick family members, that the Father of all mercies and the God of all comfort would look with favor upon them, and as it pleases Him, restore them to health or give them the grace to accept this tribulation with courage and hope.

26. for all chaplains in harm's way, that God would not let their hearts despair nor their faith fail them, but sustain, guide and comfort them.

27. for all members of the military who were disabled during their duty, that our heavenly Father would mercifully guide, aid and strengthen all those with physical disabilities, enabling them to find fulfillment in their lives and encouragement for all their endeavors.

28. with thanksgiving to God for providing LCMS chaplains to serve members of the armed forces. Please pray that military chaplains would have every opportunity to share the saving Gospel of Jesus Christ with members of the military and anyone with whom they work and live.

29. for all military chaplains upon their return, that they would be reunited with their families, find gainful employment and receive all the care they need to heal their minds, bodies and souls. Grant that they would always look to Christ as their rock and their redeemer.

30. for those who minister to the armed forces, that by God's gracious working, they may honor Christ and advance the good of those committed to their care, through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

Greetings in the name of Jesus, our risen Savior,

Assuming that you are still basking in the glow of Easter, the following seems appropriate as we consider just what the Resurrection means to us. The article is taken from the Lenten devotion published by Lutherans For Life entitled Christ the Life of All the Living.

Resurrection (John 5:24-29) by Rev. Richard J. Serina, Jr.

"Do not marvel at this, for an hour is coming, when all who are in the tombs will hear his voice and come out." (John 5:28-29a)

A tomb sounds strange to us. You don't see them much. We are more accustomed to graves or, where I live on the East Coast, urns or a columbarium. Whether we are talking tombs, graves, urns, or columbaria, however, the symbolism is the same---death, loss, and grief.

Yet your Lord promises something more. He promises life again in the body for all those who die in the faith. He promises that the mortal bodies we have---bodies that die justly and rightly because of sin---will be made alive and will live and reign with their Lord forever. Yes, the same God who breathed the breath of life into Adam and created him out of dust, the same God who fashioned Eve out of a rib from Adam's side, the same God who has been giving life since the garden of Eden, promises that He will give life to your dead bodies.

If you need confirmation of that, look no further than the empty tomb on Easter. As you gather for worship and hear the stories of the women and Peter finding that stone rolled away and Jesus' body no longer there, imagine yourself in that tomb and finding the grave clothes laid aside and Jesus's once-dead body gone. Know that this Lord, the One through whom all things were made, will raise your bodies just as surely as He rose again from the dead. It doesn't matter if it is a tomb, grave, urn, or columbarium. Jesus is victorious over death, and He will be victorious over yours, too.

Prayer: Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, as Jesus was raised from the dead, bring us at last to where He is, that we might live forever with Him. Amen.
