When to Call Your Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,

Most people are familiar with the jokes about a pastor's schedule...that he only has to work one day a week and, therefore, he has it pretty easy Monday-Saturday! In reality, most people don't believe the joke. My experience is that people believe the opposite to be more true: the pastor is so busy that he should not be bothered. I know this because many people with whom I interact, either in person or on the phone, comment, "Oh, Pastor, I know you're so busy..." or "I hate to bother you..."

Here's the truth about my schedule (and most pastors I know): it's flexible! A pastor's schedule must be responsive to the needs of the people he is called to serve. Yes, it's true that a pastor's schedule can fill up with all sorts of obligations. I also have a wife and children. Nevertheless, I am your pastor 24 hours a day, 7 days week. So don't be afraid to call me, especially when you need a pastor!

Here's a helpful reminder for you concerning specific situations when you should call your pastor:

- At the time of hospitalization. The days are long gone when the hospitals will call the church to let us know you're in the hospital. If you want the pastor to visit, don't assume he knows you're there, even if you told some of your friends from church. Call him! Some people are anxious about the pastor visiting when they're not looking their best. Don't be concerned! Your pastor wants to bring the comfort of God's Word to you when you need it most. One old German word for pastor is "seelsorger", which translated means "curer of souls." The medicine of God's Word and Sacrament is needed when a person is sick just as much as the medicine and therapy that comes from physicians and nurses.
- At the time of death of a loved one. It's preferable, if at all possible, that you call the pastor before death occurs. Your pastor has words of comfort for the dying person as well as for family members confronted by the reality of death. Your pastor also can be a resource to help you navigate the steps that need to be followed following death.
- During times of medical testing or when a difficult diagnosis is received. It can be difficult to face the uncertainty of waiting for test results or coping with an unpleasant diagnosis. Your pastor wants to pray with you and for you to help you cast your cares upon the Lord and trust in His faithfulness to endure.
- You know you will be absent from worship for an extended period of time. Sometimes, people can't get to church because of illness, frailty, weather, or other job-related issues. Whatever the reason, don't be afraid to call your pastor. He can come right to your home and bring you God's gifts with a brief service of Scripture and the Sacrament.
- You are experiencing marital, family, or relationship difficulties. If your marriage is struggling, if you are struggling as a parent, or if difficult family circumstances emerge, your pastor is trained to apply God's

Word to the different situations that come up as sinful people live and/or interact with one another. Such difficulties could include unemployment, imprisonment, addiction, abuse, mental health, etc. A pastor is a "safe" person to speak to, but he is not a professionally trained therapist. His wisdom and counsel is only from the Word of God. He may even suggest that you seek professional help. Remember also, your pastor prays for you and your family and you can enlist his prayers.

- At pregnancy and the birth of a child. Your pastor will not ask you if you are pregnant! Please let your pastor know so he can pray for you and your unborn child. Likewise, when the child is born let the pastor know. If you'd like a visit in the hospital, please tell him. I will not visit a mom and baby in the hospital without your approval ahead of time. I know as a father of young children how hectic and tiring it is after birth and I want to respect that time you have as a family together with your new little one. If, God forbid, there are complications at the birth of a child, call your pastor. He can come and perform an emergency baptism.
- You are thinking about becoming engaged/become engaged to be married. Your pastor should be one of the people that you seek guidance from as you make such an important life decision. Certainly, the pastor should be consulted before you select a wedding date! A Christian marriage needs to be rooted and grounded in God's Word and Christ's love. Your pastor will meet with an engaged couple for pre-marriage instruction.
- You have spiritual struggles or questions. Questions often come up about the faith that you may not know how to answer. Don't be afraid to talk with your pastor about them. Most pastors love to discuss God's Word and help people grow in their understanding of it.
- Your conscience is troubled by sin and you desire the assurance of God's forgiveness and grace. Let's face it, even faithful church members sin. However, God does not leave you alone to struggle with temptation and guilt. The devil loves to use such opportunities to lead even Christians to despair. God invites you to confess your sin and receive forgiveness for Christ's sake. You can go to your pastor for "Individual Confession & Absolution" knowing for certain that he will not reveal what is confessed, neither will he judge you. He will speak God's Word to you so that you will leave knowing "as far as the east is from the west so have your transgressions been removed".
- You have a friend or relative who wants to know more about faith in Christ. One way of spreading the Gospel is to invite people to come and see. Don't be afraid to invite your friends to speak to your pastor, especially if they have questions that you don't know how to answer!

5 Healthy Breakfasts to Jumpstart Your Day

These breakfasts are easy to make and good for you.

No matter what your age, it's important to eat breakfast. The food eaten upon waking is used to refuel the body after a night of sleep and sets the stage for the rest of the day.

Here are 5 reasons to have breakfast before you head out the door. Research shows that people who eat breakfast:

- Are more likely to eat healthier.
- Are more likely to consume fewer calories throughout the day.
- Are more likely to be at a healthier weight.
- Are more likely to participate in physical activity.
- Are less likely to feel tired and irritable.

While eating breakfast is important, it's equally important that you make nutritious food choices. Don't just grab a bowl of sugary cereal or a doughnut on the way out the door. Better breakfast options include a mix of protein, healthy fat and fiber with little or no added sugar.

Here are some breakfast ideas that can be eaten quickly before leaving the house or even on-the-go:

Slow cooker oatmeal – Make oatmeal while you sleep so it's ready and waiting for you in the morning.

Egg muffins – Cook up a batch of muffins made from eggs mixed with chopped ham, turkey bacon, low-fat cheese or veggies.

Breakfast quesadilla – Spread low-fat cheese, mashed beans and salsa on a whole-wheat tortilla. Fold in half and microwave.

Spinach feta egg wrap – Saute spinach, mushrooms and tomatoes in cooking spray and then add an egg or egg whites, stirring until set. Wrap in a whole-wheat tortilla.

Quinoa bake – Mix 1 cup uncooked quinoa with cinnamon, nutmeg, 2 diced apples and 1/4 cup raisins. Put in a square baking dish sprayed with cooking spray. Add 2 eggs mixed with 2 cups low-fat milk and 1/4 cup maple syrup and stir. Sprinkle with chopped almonds and bake at 350° for 1 hour.

These breakfasts can be made in advance and stored in the fridge or freezer and then heated in the microwave in the morning.

Trinity History Notes



Pastors Serving the 1895 Church



Rev. Purzner

Rev. Christian Purzner was here during the design and construction of the new church downtown. He was born in Brooklyn, NY, in 1855. Confirmed in Egg Harbor, NJ, he attended Fort Wayne Seminary in 1878 and finished his ministerial training at the St. Louis Seminary in 1881. He was ordained in Wittenberg, WI in 1881.

His first assignment, in 1881, was to serve as missionary to 13 stations in Wisconsin. In June 1884, he accepted a call to Junction City, KS. His next call was to Trinity, November 1889. After Trinity he went on to serve Egypt Mills, MO, in 1896; Kansas City in 1903; Assistant professor at Fort Wayne, 1910; pastor, Avilla, IN, 1916-1922. He died April 15, 1929, and buried at Concordia Seminary.

Germany, in 1864.



Rev. Kaepfel

Rev. Friedrich Meyer followed Rev. Purzner. He was born in Hannover, Germany, in 1864. After graduating from Concordia Seminary, he was ordained and served in Pueblo, CO, 1889. He was then called to St. Peter, St. Joseph, MO, 1896. Trinity called him in 1892 and he served till he accepted a call to be Director of Lutheran High School, Milwaukee, WI, 1904. He died November 5, 1942, and buried at St. Peter Church Cemetery, Detroit, MI.

Rev. John Henry Christian Kaepfel followed Rev. Meyer. Rev. Kaepfel was born in Cleveland, OH, in 1853. He attended Concordia College, Fort Wayne, IN, and Concordia Seminary, St. Louis. His first positions were as teacher in St. Louis area parochial schools in 1874, and teacher at St. Louis Lutheran High School, 1878. Trinity called him in 1887. His time here was short leaving to become director of St. Paul College, Concordia, in 1888. Rev. Kaepfel's father accompanied him to Trinity where he was the first trained teacher to teach in Trinity School. School enrollment doubled when he came. Rev. Kaepfel died February 3, 1925, and is buried in Concordia.



Freedom to be faithful prevails at Supreme Court

Last week, the U.S. Supreme Court handed down a decisive victory for the work of pro-life pregnancy centers and for free speech in general.

"We rejoice at this ruling," said the Rev. Michael Salemink, executive director of Lutherans For Life. "It safeguards fairness and freedom. Pregnancy resource centers share a truth and show a love that saves lives. They serve with the compassion of our Savior Jesus. Removing obstacles to these interactions and relationships certainly enhances this outreach."

The case began when California passed the "Reproductive FACT Act" in 2015, requiring pro-life pregnancy centers with a medical license to advertise free or low-cost abortions offered through the state. Pregnancy centers not needing a license were forced to say so in a 29-word statement translated into multiple languages and posted "conspicuously." Moreover, this statement must be printed on all advertising materials in a font size at least as large as the words of the advertisement.

In response to the law, the National Institute of Family and Life Advocates (NIFLA) sued to halt its enforcement, arguing that the law unconstitutionally compels speech that is opposed to the very mission of these pregnancy centers.

Established case law requires that whenever a government deems it necessary to alter the content of speech, it must meet the "strict scrutiny" standard. That means the onus is on the government to prove that the alteration 1) meets a compelling government interest, and (2) does so in the least restrictive way possible.

However, the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals applied a different standard. It admitted that the FACT Act altered the speech of pro-life pregnancy centers and that it did not meet the strict scrutiny standard. But it then attempted to carve out a new category of "professional speech" that can be altered with only "intermediate scrutiny."

The U.S. Supreme Court rejected the Ninth Circuit's notion of "professional speech," remanding the case back to California's Supreme Court with instructions to apply the standard of strict scrutiny. In so doing, the U.S. Supreme Court determined that NIFLA was "likely to succeed on the merits of their claim that the FACT Act violates the First Amendment" (*NIFLA v. Becerra*, at 20).

"This is a tremendously significant victory for free speech and First Amendment rights," said the Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison, president of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS). "It's shocking that four justices not only support the denial of life and liberty to the millions who are aborted, but also support forcing Christians involved in providing God-pleasing alternatives — saving lives — to advertise for abortionists."

Similar cases in Texas, New York, Maryland and Illinois have already been settled in favor of the free speech of pregnancy centers. However, other cases within the jurisdiction of the Ninth Circuit are still pending. The city of San Francisco and the state of Hawaii have also asserted the power to tell pregnancy centers what they must say. This ruling will likely settle those cases in favor of the pregnancy centers.

The attempt to create a new category of "professional speech" that applied to pregnancy care centers would likely have opened the door to similar control over the speech of pastoral counselors, teachers and other professionals who serve people with the Gospel. This alarming prospect has now been turned aside.

The Rev. Robert Zagore, executive director of the LCMS Office of National Mission, explained, "This is a blessing on a lot of levels. The Supreme Court has ruled that the government cannot compel a church or other faith-based organization to proclaim a message contrary to its faith. That has a lot of implications."

While the NIFLA decision hinged on strict scrutiny, Justice Anthony Kennedy penned a brief, but powerful, concurrence to underscore the Court's commitment to preventing the government from discriminating against certain viewpoints or faiths. He wrote, "[T]his law is a paradigmatic example of the serious threat presented when government seeks to impose its own message in the place of individual speech, thought, and expression" (*NIFLA v. Becerra*, Kennedy concurrence, at 1).

The Rev. Dr. Gregory P. Seltz, executive director of the Lutheran Center for Religious Liberty, said, "The legal victory in the NIFLA case is a welcome undergirding of our First Amendment, religious-liberty protection in this country."

The 5-4 ruling came only one day after the same Court vacated the Washington State Supreme Court's ruling against a Washington florist. Barronelle Stutzman was punished for declining to celebrate a same-sex "wedding" as a confession of her faith. After reconsidering her case in light of the Masterpiece Cakeshop decision, the Court ruled that the state of Washington had acted unjustly toward her in the same way that Colorado had unjustly prosecuted Jack Phillips.

Taken together, this cascade of recent rulings from the Court has done much to reassert the Court's commitment to a robust understanding of the First Amendment.

National Youth Gathering Update - National Youth Gathering 2019 Minneapolis is fast approaching and God has blessed Trinity with an amazing group of 42 youth and leaders that are planning to attend.
