

Holy Communion at Trinity

We believe that in the Lord's Supper, God gives us not only bread and wine, but also the very body and blood of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of our sins. Our Lord invites all to his table who believe this and repent of all sins. Visitors who hold a different confession of faith from this congregation yet desire to commune are asked to speak to one of the pastors before the service. We offer gluten-free wafers, and non-alcoholic wine is available in the center of the individual trays.

Old Testament Reading

Proverbs 25:2–10

It is the glory of God to conceal things, but the glory of kings is to search things out. As the heavens for height, and the earth for depth, so the heart of kings is unsearchable. Take away the dross from the silver, and the smith has material for a vessel; take away the wicked from the presence of the king, and his throne will be established in righteousness. Do not put yourself forward in the king's presence or stand in the place of the great, for it is better to be told, "Come up here," than to be put lower in the presence of a noble. What your eyes have seen do not hastily bring into court, for what will you do in the end, when your neighbor puts you to shame? Argue your case with your neighbor himself, and do not reveal another's secret, lest he who hears you bring shame upon you, and your ill repute have no end.

Epistle

Hebrews 13:1–17

Let brotherly love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares. Remember those who are in prison, as though in prison with them, and those who are mistreated, since you also are in the body. Let marriage be held in honor among all, and let the marriage bed be undefiled, for God will judge the sexually immoral and adulterous. Keep your life free from love of money, and be content with what you have, for he has said, "I will never leave you nor forsake you." So we can confidently say, "The Lord is my helper; I will not fear; what can man do to me?"

Remember your leaders, those who spoke to you the word of God. Consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. Do not be led away by diverse and strange teachings, for it is good for the heart to be strengthened by grace, not by foods, which have not benefited those devoted to them. We have an altar from which those who serve the tent have no right to

eat. For the bodies of those animals whose blood is brought into the holy places by the high priest as a sacrifice for sin are burned outside the camp. So Jesus also suffered outside the gate in order to sanctify the people through his own blood. Therefore let us go to him outside the camp and bear the reproach he endured. For here we have no lasting city, but we seek the city that is to come. Through him then let us continually offer up a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that acknowledge his name. Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God.

Obey your leaders and submit to them, for they are keeping watch over your souls, as those who will have to give an account. Let them do this with joy and not with groaning, for that would be of no advantage to you.

Holy Gospel

Luke 14:1–14

One Sabbath, when Jesus went to dine at the house of a ruler of the Pharisees, they were watching him carefully. And behold, there was a man before him who had dropsy. And Jesus responded to the lawyers and Pharisees, saying, “Is it lawful to heal on the Sabbath, or not?” But they remained silent. Then he took him and healed him and sent him away. And he said to them, “Which of you, having a son or an ox that has fallen into a well on a Sabbath day, will not immediately pull him out?” And they could not reply to these things.


Now he told a parable to those who were invited, when he noticed how they chose the places of honor, saying to them, “When you are invited by someone to a wedding feast, do not sit down in a place of honor, lest someone more distinguished than you be invited by him, and he who invited you both will come and say to you, ‘Give your place to this person,’ and then you will begin with shame to take the lowest place. But when you are invited, go and sit in the lowest place, so that when your host comes he may say to you, ‘Friend, move up higher.’ Then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at table with you. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted.”

He said also to the man who had invited him, “When you give a dinner or a banquet, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors, lest they also invite you in return and you be repaid. But when you give a feast, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you. You will be repaid at the resurrection of the just.”

HAPPY DRIFTERS - SEPTEMBER: Join your Happy Drifters friends as we attend the 59th John Findley Green Foundation Lecture by Dr. Madeleine K. Albright at Westminster College on Thursday, **September 19** at 1:30 pm. The theme is "Breakthrough." The inspiration for the theme is centered around the 30th anniversary of the fall of the Berlin Wall and will "focus on human breakthroughs in every aspect of our life." Albright, the first-ever female secretary of state, will be following in the footsteps of other well-known lecturers such as former Presidents Harry T. Truman, Gerald Ford and George H.W. Bush, and former Secretary of State James Baker. Other speakers include former British Prime Ministers Winston Churchill and Margaret Thatcher, former USSR President Mikhail Gorbachev and former Polish President Lech Walesa.

Before the lecture, we will have lunch in the dining hall at Westminster College. After the lecture, we will tour the Churchill Library. It remembers the life of Winston Churchill and keeps his memory alive for future generations. We will enter the magnificent Christopher Wren-designed Church of St. Mary the Virgin, Aldermanbury. Dating back to the 17th Century, the Church was painstakingly moved from

London to Fulton and lovingly reconstructed, stone-by-stone, on the Westminster College campus. Featuring a hand crafted tracker organ and an original Wren pulpit, the Church now stands exactly as Wren's design envisaged in 1677.

We will walk through the sculpture Breakthrough, created from eight sections of the actual Berlin Wall by celebrated artist Edwina Sandys, Churchill's granddaughter. We will enter the historic Gymnasium where Churchill delivered his famous 'Iron Curtain' speech, its structure frozen in time waiting for you to walk into the past.

Costs are as follows: Lunch is \$7.50, the lecture is free, and the Churchill Museum is \$9.00. We have been allocated 20 tickets for both the lecture and guided tour.

Please sign up by September 8. We will meet at the church at 10:15 am to carpool. Lunch arrival is 11:00. Lecture is 1:30 to 2:30, and the Churchill Museum tour is 3:00 to 4:00.


